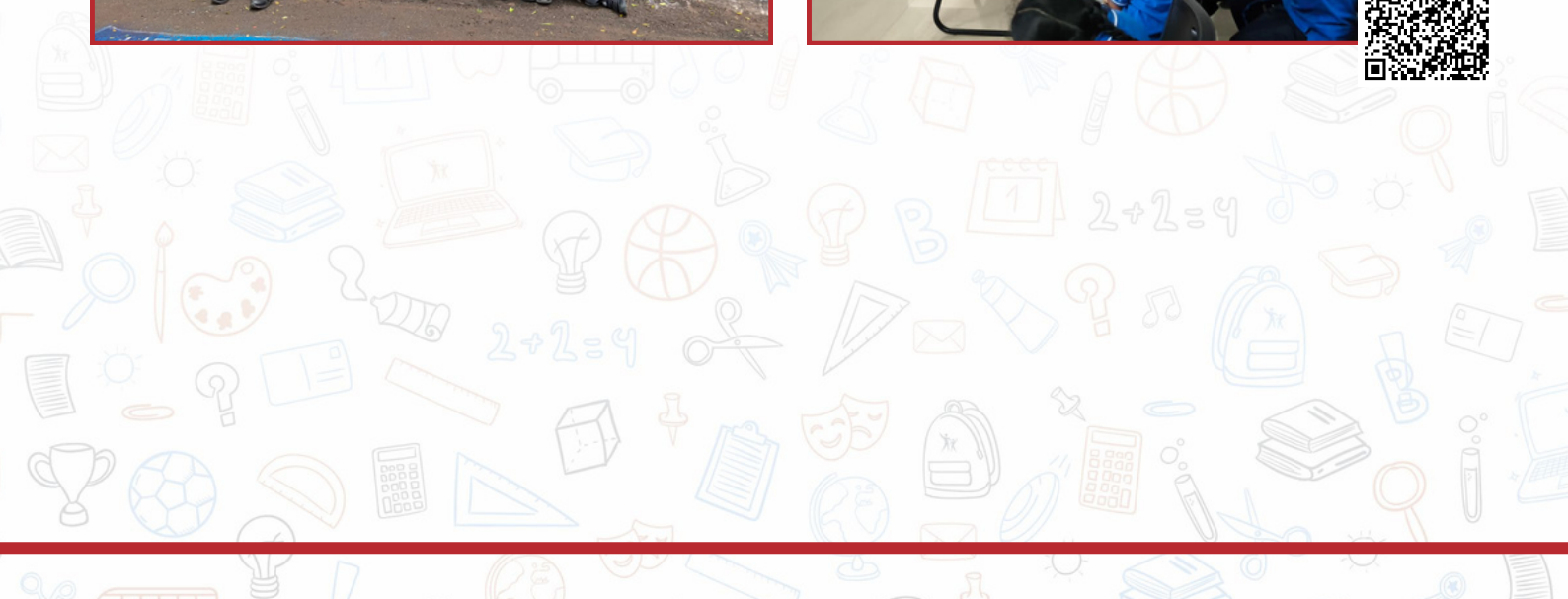
“Learning Beyond the Classroom”

Grade 3 - Unit of Inquiry - Literature Civilization

As part of our units Literature and Civilization, Grade 3 students went on an enriching field trip to Ambedkar University. They visited the History Museum and the Knowledge Resource Centre, where they had the opportunity to connect their classroom learning with real-world experiences.

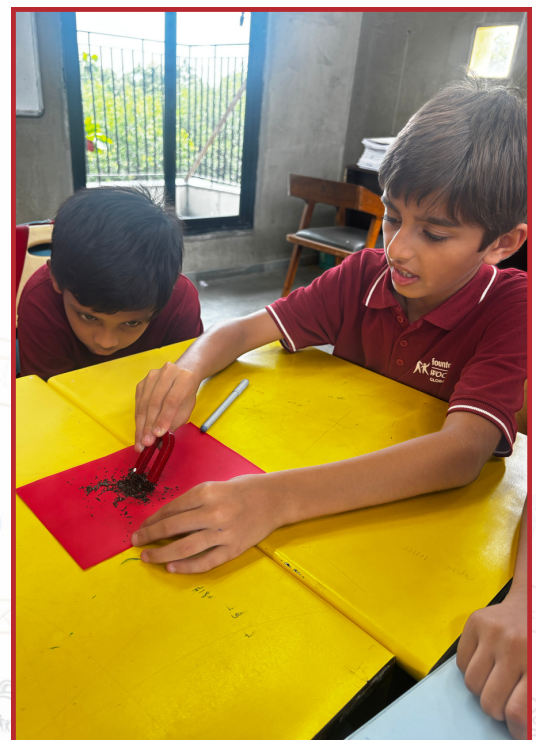

Grade 6 - Integrated Sciences

As a part of their unit “Reaching the Age of Adolescence - Growing Minds & Growing Bodies,” our Grade 6 students took their learning beyond the classroom by collaborating with Grade 5 CBSE students. Through engaging activities, students shared their understanding of puberty, hormones, personal hygiene, and peer influence. Flashcard quizzes and gland-function matching activities made the learning interactive and meaningful. The experience encouraged students to communicate, collaborate, apply their knowledge, and confidently share their learning with younger peers. A meaningful journey of learning, sharing, and growing together.



“From Classroom to Mall: Mathematics comes Alive”

Grade 7 - Mathematics

Mathematics stepped beyond the classroom as our Grade 7 students explored Prozone Mall, discovering how percentages shape everyday decisions. Students observed real-world discounts, offers, and price changes, comparing prices and calculating savings using their understanding of percentages.

The experience brought MYP Mathematics Criterion D: Applying Mathematics in Real-Life Contexts to life, helping students connect classroom concepts with practical situations. From “What is the discount?” to “How much do I save?” every question became an opportunity to think mathematically. Sometimes, the best classroom has no walls at all.



“Where Mathematics Meets the Art of Himroo”

Grade 9 - Mathematics

Mathematics came alive beyond the classroom as Grade 9 students visited a traditional Himroo weaving factory, discovering how mathematical concepts are woven into intricate craftsmanship. Students observed patterns, symmetry, motifs, and transformations, connecting classroom learning to the Key Concepts of Form and Patterns and the Global Context of Personal and Cultural Expression.



The experience offered a unique opportunity to see how mathematics, culture, creativity, and craftsmanship intersect-transforming familiar concepts into a meaningful real-world experience. They weren't just observing Himroo; they were seeing mathematics through a new lens.

“From Classroom Concepts to Real-World Banking”

Grade 9 - Integrated Humanities

Grade 9 students took their learning beyond the classroom with an engaging visit to SBI Bank, connecting their study of Financial Institutions with real-world banking practices. Students observed banking operations, interacted with professionals, and explored accounts, Fixed Deposits, loans, interest rates, banking services, and the role of the RBI. Their questions about bank reserves, interest rates, and financial stability encouraged them to think beyond textbook definitions.

The visit transformed classroom concepts into real experiences and deeper understanding, strengthening students' ability to observe, question, communicate, and make meaningful connections. When learning meets the real world, curiosity becomes understanding.



“Turning Learning into Sustainable Action” Grade 10 - Integrated Humanities

From Old T-Shirts to Sustainable Solutions. As a part of their Integrated Humanities, Service as Action for the unit Ecological Footprints, Grade 10 students transformed old T-shirts into reusable tote bags. Through this hands-on initiative, students explored how upcycling can reduce textile waste and encourage alternatives to single-use plastic. Their creativity turned discarded materials into something practical, purposeful, and sustainable. Small changes. Creative thinking. A lighter ecological footprint.



“Reimagining Waste for a More Sustainable School” Grade 10 - Integrated Humanities

As a part of their Service as Action for the unit Ecological Footprints, our grade 10 students designed a manually operated sanitary pad dispenser using repurposed plastic for school restrooms. The compact, durable, and electricity-free design aims to provide easy access to sanitary pads during emergencies, while giving discarded plastic a meaningful second life. This initiative demonstrates how design thinking, sustainability, and social responsibility can come together to create practical solutions for the school community. Repurpose. Rethink.
